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On March 20, Village Manager Abe Zambrano, as Chief Budget Officer of the Village, released his proposed Tentative Village Budget for fiscal year 2012/2013.

The Tentative Budget provides the basis for current and upcoming deliberations by the Board of Trustees during which modifications to the tentative budget are

typically introduced. A Public Hearing on the Proposed budget will also be held on Mon., April 9 at 7:30 pm. By law, the final budget must be adopted before May 1st.

As proposed, the Tentative 2012/2013 Village General fund budget

calls for total appropriations \$17,834,848. Of this amount \$6,691,361 would be raised through non-tax revenues, fund balance and retirement reserves. The amount to be raised by taxes is proposed to be \$11,143,487. which represents a 6.76% tax rate increase or a rate of \$253.209 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Overall the total assessed valuation increased by \$29,911, largely due to increases in special franchise as-Real property assessment sessments. decreased by \$31,901.

In the Village's Tentative budget, government operations are held flat and services are all maintained. The large mandated increases required by personnel contracts, retirement costs and health benefits are the key factor in the proposed tax increase.

Under the NYS Property Tax Cap legislation passed last year, the annual increase in the property tax levy is limited to 2% or the rate of inflation, whichever is less. The NYS Comptroller's Office calculated that, under this law, the Village could

raise its levy by \$292,544.27 for the coming year. The passage of a local law allowing the Village to override this levy limit in Fall of 2011, permits the Village to increase the tax levy over 2%, if necessary, without incurring a penalty from the State. Under the tentative budget proposal, DPW, Recreation, Fire Dept. and the Data Processing and Insurance lines are among

> those that are seeing either a decrease in their budget or remaining the The Police Dept. same. and the Ambulance/EMS lines have proposed increases. The Police Dept. increase \$230,100 largely reflects contractual wage obliga-

tions. The Ambulance/EMS proposed increase of \$165,118 includes the cost of the paid EMT at \$150,696. However, the revenue accrued from "soft billing" to insurance companies for EMS services fully compensates this expenditure.

Contributions to the NYS Retirement System increased \$174,728 over last year's amount. Health insurance premiums increased \$119,284 over the prior year. Both are mandated expenses. A small increase in short-term debt of \$10,008 reflects the Village's planned strategy of amortizing some debt over a 5-year period and saving thousands in interest that would accrue if the same amount was borrowed as long-term debt. Long-term debt will also increase in the 2012/2013 budget by \$69,429.

For the Water and Sewer Funds, the tentative budget calls for an increase in water rates to \$5.025/100 cubic feet of consumption from \$4.50 for Tier 2 with corresponding increases for higher tiers. The Basic water rate would not change.

# Morrissey - Woman of Distinction


Croton's Rosalind Morrissey is representing Croton in the 40th NYS Senate District as our Woman of Distinction.






programs are available in the Recreation Office in the Municipal Building and at the Croton Library. The triplicate forms for each program must be filled out and returned with full payment by the registration deadline.

#### **Tree City, USA**

#### **Yard Waste**

Spring cleanup is underway for many resident homeowners. The DPW will help you in disposing of your debris by collecting yard waste during the spring, summer and fall months. Leaves, twigs and small branches, clippings and flowers are all considered yard waste.

Yard waste must be put out in bio-degradable leaf bags or open-top garbage containers. **NO waste in plastic bags will be collected.** 

Yard waste will be collected on Wednesdays, not with the regular garbage and recycling collections. Collection of yard waste will begin in April.

The schedule is as follows:

- North of Rte.129 (Maple St.) -1st & 3rd Weds.
- South of Rte. I29 (Maple St.) -2nd & 4th Weds.

The DPW will provide residents with paper bags for yard waste disposal on a first come first served basis. Up to 10 bags may be picked up at the DPW garage between 7 am and 2 pm from Mon. through Fri. while supplies last. There is a limited number of bags remaining. Once the supply is exhausted, the DPW will not supply bags for yard waste in the future.

There will be NO pickup on May 30th, August 29th or October 31st. For more info. call DPW at 271-3775.

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# Tentative Budget Cont'd.

The Sewer rate would also increase to \$0.4759/100 cubic feet of water used from \$0.4139/100.

The updated 5-year Capital Program budget is also included in the tentative budget. Proposed Water System Improvements (replacement of water mains in two areas) is the largest proposed expenditure at \$2,500,000 in 2012/2013. Regular recurring infrastructure maintenance also accounts for \$1,100,000 in the capital budget. Improvements to the bulkhead of the Yacht Club are scheduled as well at \$2,500,000.

In the past year the Village's auditors, O'Connor, Davis, Munns & Dobbins, LLP have expressed that the Village is in excellent financial condition. Moody's Investor Services have given the Village a very high Aa2 bond rating. A schedule of topics to be covered at budget work sessions is on page 3.

#### Be Alert for Scams!

Croton's Police Dept. is advising residents to be alert for scams. A common one that has already occurred in the Village is a telephone scam where you receive a call saying a relative is out of the country and needs money for an emergency situation. The caller generally wants an amount in the range of \$2500 to be electronically transferred to them. Once the money is sent, it is too late. Be sure to confirm the caller's story with a family

member or someone who would know whether it is true.



At this time of year, scams involving phony home construction or home services are common. These scams usually offer a very low price for a service or repair. Then when the work is

done, they claim more work is needed at a high price with the money needed upfront. After receiving the money, they do not return to do the work. Be sure to check with the Better Business Bureau, ask for references and business cards and a telephone number where a person actually answers to help avoid this happening to you.
