Croton's Police Department

Public safety for Village residents is a multi-faceted job, and the goal, of Croton's Police Dept. Only a phone call away at 271-5177 or 911 (by land line), Croton's Police Dept. 24/7 dispatching and on-the-road presence provides a rapid response to a myriad of situations. These range from simple calls for assistance to investigating suspicious activities, traffic infractions, accidents, drug overdoses, physical violence, medical aid, thefts and much more. The Department also is equipped with defribillators and Narcan kits.

Beyond responding to calls, however, the Police Dept. also has a steady visibility in the Village and provides friendly outreach with its officers' daily presence in the Upper Village business area as well as at numerous public events such as Summerfest, parades, the Run Against Hunger and others.

The Police Department works closely with the schools and school-age youth in providing education and guidance in a variety of settings including the inschool D.A.R.E. program, health classes, a Halloween safety program, a Youth Cadet program, the Youth Academy and hosting cub scouts and girl scouts at the Police station.

The Croton department is also one of the biggest community participants on Croton's Coalition Against Drug and Alcohol Abuse. As part of their commitment to this program, they are active participants in the Vassallofest program of education on substance abuse and the Candlelight Vigil to remember those who are struggling or have struggled with such abuse. They also participate in a program to educate local businesses on the laws regarding the sale of alcohol.

As the Village includes the busiest Hudson Line Metro North train station, the County's Croton Point Park, and is adjacent to the Croton Dam Park, both the Hudson and Croton Rivers, and New York City's reservoir system, the Croton work collaboratively with the Police MTA Police, Westchester County Police, NYS Police, NYS DEC and NYC DEP police as well as neighboring municipal departments. Due to proximity to these locations, the Croton Police are frequently the first to be dispatched on mutual aid and first to reach the scene when calls affecting these areas are received. Importantly, Croton Police have a deserved

reputation for their follow-up on all calls. The Police Department, including its Chief, Anthony

Tramaglini, has 21 members in two divisions - Patrol and Detective. In the year ending December 31, 2015, there were 4679 total calls for police services. The number of crimes reported and investigated by the patrol division as well as the Detective division was 267. Patrol issued 655 vehicle/traffic tickets and went to 343 motor vehicle accidents. Overall there were 348 arrests including such infractions as criminal sale of controlled substances, criminal possession of marijuana, tampering with evidence, DWI, and more. The Department also responded to 758 Fire and Ambulance calls. They are frequently the first on the scene for these situations as well.

The Police Department, located on the west side of the Municipal Building, also .

New Press Box in Dobbs Park

Croton's Little League organization has long desired a Press Box for the ball field at Dobbs Park where it plays many of its games. An agreement was reached in 2015 and finalized in Spring of 2016 in which Croton Little League would construct a Press Box and donate it to the Village. It replaces a smaller one-story shed at the site.

The Press Box will be used to house equipment and as a location for announcing its games. The sound amplifi-



cation system must be pre-approved by the Village as well as its volume and times of use.

Under the agreement, Croton Little League has transferred ownership to the Village and will assume liability and

future maintenance costs for the Press Box. The three-year agreement was finalized in April. The accompanying photo shows the new Press Box and a new scoreboard as well.

2016/2017 Budget Approved

The budget for fiscal year 2016/2017 for the Village was adopted by the Board of Trustees on April 18. The budget calls total appropriations of \$18,826,308 of which \$11,313,859.34 will be raised through property taxes. This amount is only \$1,000 less than the total amount permitted under New York State's Tax Levy Cap. As such the Village has met the criteria of



both the Tax Cap and Tax Freeze, thereby enabling resident property owners to receive a rebate check from NYS in the Fall of this year. (The rebate check this year will be the second and final rebate checks under the NYSTax Freeze program.) Under the approved Tax

Levy, property owners see an increase of \$1.206 in their tax rate over the 2015/2016 tax rate. The new rate is \$254.079 per 1000 of Assessed Valuation. This is a percentage increase of 0.47%

The Village's total assessed valuation increased slightly this year over last - \$63,566.

Village tax bills will be sent out on June 1 and are payable by June 30, 2016.

Cadet and Youth Academy Programs

The Croton Police Department participates in two programs aimed at youth interested in the law enforcement and the criminal justice systems.

It's Youth Police Cadets program, for youth aged 13 to 17, meets twice a month under the supervision of Village Police Officers. During its meetings, students learn about techniques used by the police as well as become familiar with various equipment that is used in law enforcement. Simulated situations offer a real opportunity to understand how police officers conduct their jobs. Currently there are 15 local youth participating.

Members of the Croton Police Dept. also provide the leadership, along with Peekskill police, for the Westchester Youth Police Academy conducted at PACE University in Pleasantville. This 6-week program is for high school Seniors with up to 40 participants from county high schools. Croton students who participate do so as part of their CHOOSE program in the Spring of their Senior Year.

As part of the Youth Academy program, an internship program in the field of law enforcement, students participate in physical training, lessons from law enforcement experts and hands on learning experiences. The program includes learning field skills, attending a mock trial in a County court room, visits to the County Forensics lab and shooting range, learning about Penal law and information on substance abuse. Those who complete the course receive certificates and PACE also offers them 3 credits towards its Criminal Justice degree.

My family has our first dog. What regulations for dogs should we

be aware of? Dogs are not allowed to roam off-leash anywhere in the Village except at the Dog Park at Black Rock for which a permit is required. Cro-




ton Landing Park is the only park where leashed dogs are permitted during park hours and may only be walked on the paved Riverwalk Trail on a maximum 6 foot leash. All other parks, fields, and school properties are off-limits to dogs, leashed or unleashed. Leashed dogs may be curbed in the part of the street lying between the two curb lines. All feces must be removed by the walker and deposited in an airtight container and placed in a refuse container - never in storm drains or sewers.

In New York State all dogs, 4 months and older, must be licensed. Licenses for Village residents' dogs can be obtained in the Village Office for a fee



upon presenting a current rabies certificate. The fee is 15 or 25 depend-

ing upon whether the dog is spayed or neutered. Part of the unneutered/unsprayed fee is used by the State to fund such programs across the state.

Croton's Auxiliary Police

Croton's Auxiliary Police Department is a volunteer service position in law enforcement. Typical assignments for Auxiliary Police Officers include traffic control and road closures, vehicular and foot patrols, traffic and crowd control at large events, and helping in storm and weather-related emergencies. Men and women are encouraged to volunteer. Uniforms, equipment and training are provided.

To qualify, a volunteer must be 18 years or older, have no arrest record, have a valid NYS Divers License, be in good physical conditions to perform the requirements of the job, and either live or work in Croton-on-Hudson or the Town of Cortlandt.
