position, with many applications submitted and several interviews conducted. The Board believed that the professionalism and leadership Ms. King has shown during her time in Village government made her uniquely qualified for the position of Village Manager.

Ms. King has been Assistant Village Manager since 2008, having previously served as Assistant to the Village Manager. She joined the Village on a parttime basis in 1997. Prior to joining the Village, she worked in financial management positions in both London and New York for Chase Bank. She is also a long-time Village resident. Ms. King graduated from Barnard College in Manhattan with a BA and received her Masters of Business Administration from the University of Chicago.

Ms. King's contract is for \$160,000 annual salary and extends to August

# Water System Improvements

Over the past two years, the Village has made major water infrastructure improvements. The relining and replacement of over 4 miles of water mains throughout Harmon has been most notable. This work has been very evident to residents with above ground water lines being laid in the work areas and street excavations.

While not as easily visible, equally significant upgrades to the water system have been occurring at the well fields and in the Upper Village.

The Water Dept. is nearing the end of a multi-year project that refurbished wells #1(1967), #3 (1991), and #4 (1995). These wells pump approximately 400 million gallons of water annually to 4 storage tanks in the Village.

Demand for water, especially in the

summer months, has made it difficult for any of these wells to be taken out of service for maintenance and upgrades while maintaining the required amount of water that must be available to users. In the past year, as reported in the March Newsletter, the Village has inspected, cleaned, replaced and repaired the pumps and motors of the three wells. This work is part of the centralizing of operations in-

cluding automatic monitoring and automatic chemical treatments as needed, replacing the old manual operation methods.

In July, work on Well #3 was completed with a new pump head

The Black Rock Park entrance is on Quaker Bridge Road. The passive park is located on a lake-like area of the Croton River and was acquired many years ago in an exchange of land with Westchester County. Many years ago, it was owned privately and was the location of a swimming club. Now it is a perfect spot to stroll and picnic. It is also popular for fishing.

### 8th Annual Toughman Returns

The weekend of Sept. 12 and 13 will see the return of the Toughman events centered at Croton Point Park.



This is the eighth occurrence of the centered in

Croton Point Park.

The adult event which includes a 1.2 mile swim, 56mile bike ride and 13.1 mile run will be on Sunday, Sept. 13.

All the events begin and end at Croton Point Park. The adult bike ride and running events take participants out of the park and into areas of the Village and neighboring communities.

Every effort is being made to minimize impacts to residents and others traveling through the area. The State and County-sanctioned event is being coordinated with the County Police, Croton Police, NYS Police and those of Briarcliff, Ossining and Peekskill.

There will be traffic impacts during the Sunday event. Residents should be aware that the NYSDOT has granted permission to the event to close the southbound lanes on Route 9 to all vehicular traffic from 5:30 am to 1 pm. The closure extends from Annsville Circle in Peekskill to North State Road in Briarcliff Manor. All southbound entrances to Route 9 will be closed along this route. All Ossining-bound traffic, or other points south of the village, coming into Croton on 9A from the north, will encounter a "hard detour" onto Furnace Dock Road leading them east to the Taconic. Those wishing to continue into the Village can make a right turn from Furnace Dock Rd. to Scenic Drive to reconnect to Albany Post Road into the Village. Normal traffic patterns on Route 9 will resume at 1 pm.

The running event occurs mainly in the Village along Croton Point Ave., through Van Cortlandt Manor, along streets bordering the Croton River and on Route 129 to the Croton Dam and returning on the same road. Route 129 will be reduced to one lane from 9 am through mid-day to allow residents of that section of the road to reach their homes. Other traffic will be diverted over Batten Rd.

On Saturday, September 12, Croton Point Park will be the location for the Tough Kids event (ages 6 to 14). As well, participants in the Sunday event will be registering. At the park, there will be vendors and food and merchandise available focused on health. Residents are encouraged to come to the park to see the events and visit with the vendors.

Free buses will run back and forth from the train station parking lot to the event in Croton Point Park.

and motor (see picture) and new electrical service in place. During testing, its pumping capacity has increased to 1000 gpm. Its previous pumping capacity was in the range of 600 gpm.

Additional work in the well fields includes installing a new generator with automatic transfer switching in the event of power loss. The installation of a new concrete pad for the 2 new 1000-gallon propane tanks to power the generator is also near completion. In compliance with the County Board of Health requirements, the Village is also installing equipment to provide increased chlorine contact time for water leaving the wells. Additionally, the designs for installing a corrosion inhibitor program, approved in November 2014, are also being finalized for approval by NYS. When installed it will add an orthophosphate/polyphosphate mix to inhibit lead and copper exceedances in the water.

Replacement of old water valves in areas of the Village not included in the water main replacement project

has also been occurring over the summer. During the first week of August 6 valves of 1910 and 1930's vintage were replaced in the Upper Village area. This work was mainly done at night to reduce problems for residents and businesses as the water system in this area was turned off during the

work. Heitkamp Inc., which performed the work on the water main replacements and new valves in the Harmon area, also performed this work.

River Day promotes interest in the history and ecology of the river. The Yacht Club coordinates this annual event to give its members and local exhibitors the opportunity to share their river-related knowledge with the community, thus passing on the knowledge that can safeguard the river in the future.

Food and beverages will be available for purchase.

#### Farmers' Market Bag Reuse Program

Croton's Down to Earth Farmers' Market is sup-

porting the reduction of plastic bag use by supporting the BYOBag program. There will be a raffle on Sept. 27 at the market for a chance to win a market gift certificate.



To enter, bring your extra, clean and reusable bags to

the market manager's tent on that day and receive an entry for each bag. Market vendors will not be offering handled shopping bags. If requested, they will charge 0.25 for such a bag.

The BYOBag program addresses environmental is-

sues regarding plastic bags including that a bag can take up to 1000 years to degrade, more than a trillion are used annually worldwide, and over 100 million in US annually. Plastic bags are a by-product of petroleum and natural gas and cost US retailers about \$4 billion/year. The Farmers' Market also maintains a 24/7 composter at its site at Municipal Place for people to deposit their composting materials.
