Croton's Engineering Dept. is one of the busiest of our local government offices. Village Engineer, Dan O'Connor, supervises a myriad of functions that are important to the well-being of the Village. As the name suggests, the Engineering Dept. has primary responsibility for oversight of all approved commercial and residential construction. Property assessments, building and fire inspections, and code enforcement are also under the purview of the office. Additionally, Village projects such as the Sidewalk Improvement project, the Harmon Water Main Replacement project, various drainage improvement projects and the improvements at Croton Landing are supervised by the Engineering office.

Engineer O'Connor is assisted in these tasks by Ass't. Engineer Joe Hornik, Ass't. Building Inspector and Assessor Joe Sperber, Code Enforcement Officer and Fire Inspector Pete Anfiteatro, Engineering and Planning Board Secretary Sylvia Mills, Zoning Board of Appeals Secretary Janice Fuentes, and part-time Office Assistant Phylllis Bradbury.

Commercial and residential construction activities, both new projects and renovations, account for a significant portion of the office work load. Each project starts with an application. In some cases a Planning Board approval or Zoning Board variance may be needed to proceed. Plans are typically submitted, reviewed by the Engineer, and revised before approval. A Building Permit is issued along with other needed permits. These permits may include those for demolition, tree removal, plumbing, street openings, water and waste water connections, signs, etc. Each of these is accompanied by plans which are reviewed for compliance with relevant codes. For FY 2007-2008, the total amount from these permits and fees was \$160, 311.

During the process of construction, multiple site inspections are made to ensure that it is proceeding according to the approved plans. Ultimately a Certificate of Occupancy is issued.

Often construction results in changes to a property's assessment which are made by the Assessor and add to the Village's total Assessed Valuation, an important factor in determining property taxes. Assessments may be made at several stages during a new construction project as work progresses and the value increases

All properties in the Village are subject to compliance with the regulations specified in the Village Zoning Law and Code. The Code Enforcement Officer regularly issues warnings and Violation Notices for infractions either observed by him or reported to the office. These notices must be carefully documented, letters sent to the violator, and a case presented in Village Court if the problem is not corrected satisfactorily in the specified time period.

Major government projects undertaken by the Village typically involve the development of Requests For Proposals, development of bid specification documents, bidding, awarding contracts and monitoring the work done. The paying out of Village monies to contractors is based on performance milestones. Management of the financial details such as maintaining project accounts and requesting Purchase Orders, accounting for the payment of all fees is done by the Engineering Secretary.

Additionally the Planning and Zoning Secretaries assist a steady flow of office visitors, handle phone calls, appointments and help with basic application procedures. They also prepare all Zoning and Planning Board agendas and take minutes at those meetings.

Spotlight on the Bicycle Police Patrol

On June 1st, 2008, the Croton-on-Hudson Police Department launched its Bike Patrol Unit. The unit first appeared at this year's Summerfest event and was enthusiastically greeted by the attendees.

Four officers are already trained and certified to ride, and more are expected in the future. Each has attended a one-week training class to learn the ins and outs of patrolling on a bicycle.

Croton police officers who are currently on the Bike Patrol are Sgt. Doug Oles, the coordinator, and Police Officers Cliff Gabrielson, Dave Wingfield, and John Smith. More are expected to join the patrol in the future. During the training the patrol members were taught

about riding their bicycles on different off-road and offtrail terrains as well as in different weather conditions. They also learned how to make an arrest from a bicycle when necessary. Fitness training was also included.

The Bike Patrol currently has two Fuji Police Mountain Bikes that will be used for patrols during the warmer months and at special events to bridge the gap between automobile and foot patrols. The Bike Patrol officers also have special uniforms. bicycle rack has been added to two police cars so that on a given period of patrol, both car and bicycle can be used.

Some areas of the Village that are difficult to patrol on foot or by car will be more

accessible with the bikes. Such include areas Croton Landing Park, the parks and trails along the Croton River, and other trails throughout the Village.

bility to parks, trails and walkways, will give the officers the opportunity to be more proactive in monitoring the Village. Receiving positive feedback from the community already, the patrol's benefits are apparent in terms of personal contact and interaction with the Village residents and businesses. The Bike Patrol Officers are all excited by this new opportunity.

Croton's Trails System

Residents may have noticed new trail connection markers on some Village streets as shown in the picture below. These markers are for identifying Onthe-Road trail segments that connect the wooded



sections of trails around the Village, thereby creating a network of trails. The wooded sections of the Trail System have white rectangular trail blazes located on trees.

There are several noteworthy wooded trail sections as follows. Please consult a Trails map, obtain-

able in the Village Office for detailed directions and a complete list of trails. (1) Croton Gorge Trail and a segment to Quaker Bridge Road. From the north end of Truesdale Dr. you can walk to Black Rock Park or connect to the Croton Aqueduct Trail by going over the bridge and left up the hill. This trail takes you to the Dam in one direction or Ossining in the other. (2) North Highland Place Loop (River Landing) trails. One loop begins at the barricade on North Highland and leads to a section taking you to the Upper Village area. The other loop starts at the cul-de-sac on Birch Court , returns to N. Highland Place and leads towards the Hudson River with an on-the-road segment down Brook St. to the Rte. 9 pedestrian crossing to Croton Landing and Senasqua parks. Cont'd. on page 4

Croton Trails cont'd. (3) The Highland Trail begins in the Arboretum goes around Hudson National Golf Course, accessing Croton's highest point, and making a connection with the Brinton Brook Sanctuary trails. (4) Croton Riverfront Trails, known as 'River Walk', extend along the Hudson River waterfront. The walkway in front of the Half Moon Bay condominiums is open to Croton residents and their guests. Residents should be prepared to present identification. All cyclists and walkers can also follow the bike path along the rear of the Half Moon Bay complex. Both paths lead to Croton Point Park. At Croton Landing Park, the Village and County are currently extending the trail an additional half-mile to the north.

The Village Trails are maintained by Trails Committee volunteers. They cut brush, re-blaze trails, address erosion and fallen trees, as well as develop new trail sections. The Committee is always looking for additional volunteers. If you are interested, please contact the Village Office or Chair Jan Wines (wsm2jhw@bestweb.net).
