Croton Receives Regional Commuter Choice Recognition

ers in the metropolitan area. The premise of the program is that when employers encourage alternatives, employee satisfaction increases, businesses gain a valuable recruiting tool and everyone benefits from reduced traffic congestion and improved air quality. The award recipients are categorized by the size of their organization. The 2007 winners, as a group, eliminated 60,000-plus car trips and more than a million vehicle miles traveled on regional roadways every week. Croton received an honorable mention award for their program to offer reduced commuter parking permit fees for owners of hybrid cars.

Hybrid Parking Permits Owners of a hybrid or electric car can receive a 50% reduction on the cost of a railroad station parking permit. To receive the reduction, the title and car registration must be presented at the Village office. A reduced, hybrid-car permit does not require the permit holder to park the hybrid car at the station if other cars are also owned. Croton is reimbursed for the difference in the permit rate by the NYSDOT through a program facilitated by MetroPool, Inc. which also runs the NuRide program in which Croton participates.

<u>The NuRide program</u> is an incentivebased ride-sharing network which is free to participating employers, organizations, riders and drivers. Participants can plan trips online and get rewarded for riding together. It is available to any area resident who travels regularly or irregularly, whether a car owner or not, who has registered from a participating organization at www.nuride.com. Croton is registered as a participating organization so any Village employee can take advantage of the service. Participants can offer rides or seek rides to and from work, airports or anywhere. Participants earn NuRide miles or reward points with every shared ride.

Reward miles can be redeemed with participating reward companies. The list is available at the NuRide website. Information brochures are available in the Village office.

Conservation Areas

The Board of Trustees approved the creation of a new Conservation Area designation in May. This designation is to be applied to tracts of land to ensure the protection of their natural features, cultural heritage and wildlife by establishing policies that limit or prevent detrimental activity in the sensitive area.

The first parcel to receive this Conservation Area designation is the Villageowned property known as Mayo's Landing. Acquired by the Village in 1945, the parcel provided access to the Croton River for fishing and boating. Recent overuse of the area has resulted in damage to vegetative ground cover and storm water runoff caused erosion on the slope.

To protect the Mayo's Landing area, the Village Board has determined that a Village Parks ID or a valid NYS fishing license is required for access. Signs indicating the new regulations have been installed at the Mayo's Landing site.

FAMILY ENTERTAINMENT



Spotlight on Charlie O'Connor

Fifty years ago Croton had the good fortune to have Charlie O'Connor move to the village. Although he was working then to support his family, since his retirement in 1993, Charlie has been working on behalf of Village residents as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT).

Shortly after joining the regular Fire Dept., he was asked to help with the ambulance. He has been there ever since.

taking After months of courses to be certified as an EMT, he continues training to this day. Every ambulance must have both a driver and an EMT aboard and Charlie does both.

Croton's ambulance corps provides Basic Life Support (BLS) which defines what have 5 sons and 11 grandchilprocedures can be provided.

Charlie has increased his cer- enjoy traveling to tification level to EMT Intermediate which allows him to work under the Advanced Life Support (ALS) provided by OVAC (Ossining Volunteer Ambulance Corps). OVAC operates a "fly car" to respond to these more serious emergencies.

Every Tuesday, Charlie works from 6am to 6pm with OVAC. The other 6 days he responds to Croton calls from his home. Some days he can spend 4 to 5 hours on "the rig" answering as many as 3 or 4 calls a day. Other days there might be none, but Charlie is always ready to respond. He estimates he responds to well over 350 calls a year in Croton.

Charlie and his wife, Eileen, dren but not in Croton. They

visit them throughout the northeast, North Carolina and Illinois. They will celebrate their 57th anniversary in December.

For the past 40 years, he has been a Lay Reader at Holy Name of Mary Church. Charlie was also a scout master and coach when his sons were young.

Although he no longer plays himself, one of Charlie's favorite recreational activities is volunteering for local PGA and LPGA golf tournaments held in Westchester. He has been the Captain of the first hole Marshalls at the Barclays Classic (formerly Buick Classic) at Westchester Country Club for many years.

Potassium Iodide Pills

New Potassium Iodide (KI) pills are available for distribution in the Village Office. KI pills have been available to residents from the office since Spring 2004. Pills distributed at that time have now expired and should be replaced with new KI pills.

KI pills are intended for those who live in the 10-mile radius Emergency Planning Zone around the Indian Point Power plants. It is to be taken only as directed in the event of a radiological incident. The Village Office will provide further information about KI when the tablets are distributed. When picking up KI for the members of their family, residents will be asked to sign a form indicating that is the case.

CrotonLanding/River Walk Contract Awarded

Bradhurst Site Construction Corp. has been awarded the general contract for work on both the River Walk and the Croton Landing improvements in the amount of \$2,445,885. West-Fair Electric Contractor's Inc. has received the contract for electrical work for \$179,000. Approximately \$1,900,000 will be reimbursed through several grants and county funding.

The Village has recently implemented an electronic Field Closing Subscriber List in response to this question.

Those people who subscribe to the Field Closure Email Notification System will get an email each afternoon

(M-F) by 3:30 pm notifying them of field closures for that day.

To subscribe to this list, go to <u>Quick Links</u> on Croton's Home page (www.crotononhudson-ny.gov) and select <u>Field Closure Subscriber List</u>.

On that page, select Add My Name, check the Mail List for Field Closure and provide your email address where requested. If you choose to take your name off the list, use the same procedure and select Remove My Name.

Over a year ago, there was talk of a cell tower being under consideration in Croton. What has happened to this application?

Nextel actually made two applications, one for a site in the Municipal Building and one for a site near the DPW



garage. The Municipal Building application was approved and construction has started. T-Mobile also plans an application for this site.

Although the Village had signed a lease agreement with Nextel for a

site south of the DPW salt shed, after some preliminary discussion, Nextel asked the Village to consider a different site to the north and closer to the DPW garage. The Village agreed and recently signed an amended agreement for that site. The application requires Special Permit approval from the Village Board and, if granted, a site plan approval by the Planning Board. Both require public hearings to be held. Nextel is expected to resume that process in the coming months.
