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Village Marks 125th Anniversary of Incorporation

This February marks the 125th anniversary of the incorporation of the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, which took place on February 12, 1898. The Manual of Westchester County, published the same year, noted that a special election was held "on the question of incorporation" and "the electors of that locality . . . cast seventy-four (74) votes in favor of the proposition and twenty-one (21) votes against." Croton's population at the time of incorporation was 1,244 people. Today, it is more than 8,000.

The Village's 125th Anniversary Committee will hold a celebratory 'Quasquicentennial' birthday event for the Village on Friday, February 10 at 7:30 PM in the Croton-Harmon High School auditorium. The pro-

gram, Happy Birthday, Croton, will include music, theatrical performances, a large slice of the fascinating history of the Village, and the introduction to some of the many notable people who have called Croton home over the years. The festivities will end with a reception and cake for all at Croton's 125th birthday party. This program is free to attend, but you must obtain a ticket in advance of the performance. These may be obtained at no charge on EventBrite. This will be the first of several 125th Anniversary Events that will be held throughout the year. Food Scrap Pilot Takes Off

The Village has officially launched its pi-Scrap Recycling lot Food Program to provide residents the opportunity to reduce waste by composting unused food scraps. 37 households are currently enrolled in the six-month program, which is supported by a grant secured by Croton's Sustainability Committee. Food scraps are collected weekly and taken to the Sustainable Materials Management (SMM) facility in Cortlandt Manor, where they are turned into compost, diverting organic waste from the waste-stream.

Construction Breaks Ground at 41-51 Maple Street

Construction has begun on a new housing project at the 2.4-acre parcel located at 41-51 Maple Street, known locally as the Katz Property. The site will be home to two new buildings that will contain a total of 11 one-bedroom apartments, 11 two-bedroom apartments, and 11 three-bedroom apartments. All rental apartments will be affordable to individuals and families with a range of incomes from 30% to 80% of area median income (AMI) for Westchester County. The project represents a major milestone for affordable housing in the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, which has not seen a comparable project since 2009.

The project has been awarded \$3 million in funding through New York State Homes and Community Renewal. The project is required to meet green building standards set by the New York State Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act, as well as the standards set forth in the NYStretch Energy Code, which was adopted by the Village of Croton-on-Hudson Board of Trustees in June of 2022. Reminder: County Sales Tax On Home Energy Costs Suspended

Westchester County Executive George Latimer is reminding residents to check their heating bill to ensure County sales tax collection on home energy costs from Dec. 1 to Feb. 28 has been suspended from your bill. The sales tax suspension covers home heating oil, propane, natural gas, electric, coal and wood for residential heating purposes and covers homeowners as well as rental units.

Grievance Day Information

Village property owners are entitled to file a grievance if they believe the assessed value of their property is excessive. Grievance Day for the tentative assessment roll will be held on Wednesday, February 22nd, 2023. Due to a lack of quorum, it will have been adjourned from the previous day. Applications for a tax adjustment must be completed and filed with the Village Assessor, Roger Miller, prior to 4 pm on February 21st. If your property is found to be incorrectly assessed, an adjustment will be made. To help you understand whether you should file a tax grievance to reduce your residential property assessment, perform the following calculation: Divide your property's current assessed valuation by the 2023 Residential Assessment Ratio (RAR) which is .0287. The result will provide the estimated market value of the property. For example, if your property is assessed at \$15,000, the 2023 RAR will yield a market value of \$522,648. This calculation may help you decide whether to file a grievance to try to lower the assessment. Commercial properties follow a different procedure.
